5 weeks	The central themes are what make literature stand the test of time. Universal truths about the human condition can be made fresh again with minor revisions in literary structures. In this IF, students will read, hear, and view multiple interpretations of Modernism and Harlem Renaissance literature and evaluate how each interpretation adapts the source text; they will come to understand how ideas interact and develop over time. Students will then write arguments based on relevant research to support claims using reasonable, relevant, and sufficient evidence.
