6 weeks	In this instructional focus, students will read both fiction and non-fiction texts. The texts chosen for this unit should have examples of grade appropriate vocabulary and Greek and Latin roots. The stories or novels should be of the same genre (e.g. mystery, adventure, science fiction) with a strong theme and strong characters. Students will compare and contrast characters, settings, and events in the story and determine how those characters, settings, and events either do or do not contribute to the theme of the story—all using technology (see W.5.6—keyboarding expectations). Students will also be able to draw information from multiple non-fiction sources (reference material, print, and digital media) in order to write and speak about a topic knowledgeably using grade appropriate vocabulary (see W.5.2). After examining these materials, students will be able to create a summary including a list of sources.
